**Director of Sexual Violence Prevention and Education
University of Pittsburgh**



Carrie Benson, MEd (she/her) currently serves as the inaugural director of the sexual violence prevention and education office at the University of Pittsburgh. She is responsible for ensuring that faculty, staff and students are engaged in dialogue around identifying, preventing, and responding to sexual misconduct.

She also serves as the principle-investigator of a \$500,000 seed grant, Sexual Misconduct Prevention and Survivor Support on Campus. Carrie was recognized by Pittsburgh Magazine as one of Pittsburgh's 40 under 40 young leaders in 2024. In May of 2024 her team was recognized as a Community Champion by Pittsburgh Action Against Rape.

Carrie joined Pitt as a Title IX Specialist in May 2015. Previously, she was the Assistant Director of Campus Life at Carlow University. She has experience working in diversity and inclusion, student affairs and service-learning. She earned her master's degree in education from Pitt in 2012.

Willa Campbell, MPH

Lead Prevention Educator
University of Pittsburgh

Willa Campbell, MPH (she/her) is currently the Lead Prevention Educator with the University of Pittsburgh's Office for Sexual Violence Prevention and Education. As a part of her role, Willa manages their new dialogue-based sexual misconduct prevention program, Circle Up.

In 2023, she graduated with her master's degree from the University of Pittsburgh's School of Public Health where she studied in the department of Behavioral & Community Health Sciences.

Before starting her graduate studies, she worked in the non-profit sector first as a Young Adult Case Manager with the 412 Youth Zone, a drop-in center for system-involved and homeless youth, and most recently as a Legal Advocate with Pittsburgh Action Against Rape, Allegheny County's rape crisis center.

Prevention at Pitt Programming

Awareness Building

- Basic understanding of definitions, behavioral expectations, policies, and resources.
- Understanding the scope of the issue.

Cultural Change

- Educational opportunities that engage students in dialogues and discussions around messaging, consent, healthy relationships and boundaries, bystander intervention, and survivor/victim support.
- Building community by encouraging participants to share and learn from one another in a safe environment.

Survivor/Victim Support

- Promoting a trauma-informed campus environment.

About the HESMA Survey, 2024

(Higher Education Sexual Misconduct and Awareness Survey)

- Climate Survey Administered and Prepared by Westat
- Administered at 10 AAU Institutions in the Spring of 2024
- 180,323 Total Student Participation
- Provides Information Regarding:
 - Prevalence
 - Knowledge
 - Perceptions

General Data Trends

- About **32% of all survivors** who took the survey made contact with a program or resource after their experience with sexual violence.
- **93% of women** who experienced an incident of penetration reported at least one behavioral or emotional consequence.
- The **three most important reason's** women provided for not contacting a program were:
 - **52.3%** thought she could handle it herself.
 - **47.2%** did not think the incident was serious enough to merit seeking help.
 - **37.8%** felt embarrassed, ashamed, or that it would be too emotionally difficult to report.

Sexual Violence Victimization Rates at Pitt (HESMA 2024)

(Nonconsensual sexual contact involving force or inability to consent or stop what was happening)

Female Students

- 20% undergraduates reported experiencing sexual violence.
- 9% graduate students reported experiencing sexual violence.

Male Students

- 6% undergraduates reported experiencing sexual violence.
- 1% graduate students reported experiencing sexual violence.

Trans and Nonbinary Students

- 25% undergraduates reported experiencing sexual violence.
- 15% graduate students reported experiencing sexual violence.



Consequences of Victimization at Pitt (HESMA 2024)

Survivors of sexual violence at Pitt have reported:	Women	Men
Feeling concerned for their safety on campus	46%	28%
Withdrawing from friend interactions	39%	30%
Loss of interest in daily activities, or feelings of helplessness or hopelessness	57%	49%
An increased use of drugs and alcohol	22%	23%
Withdrawing from at least one class	9%	19%
Decreased class attendance	37%	33%
Difficulty concentrating on assignments, exams, and studies	60%	51%
Considered leaving Pitt	14%	20%

Sexual Misconduct Disclosures at Pitt (HESMA 2024)


- 41.4% - 63.7% of students **did not report** because they did not believe what happened to them was "serious enough."
- 28.1% sexual violence **reported to a "program."**
 - *Program defined: police, formal reporting on campus, confidential resources.*
- 75.7% - 88.7% of students **disclosed to a peer.**





What We Learned...

- Identify ways to connect more students to support resources.
 - On-Campus Support
 - Community Resources
- Reduce stigma around experiences of sexual misconduct.
- Create safe spaces where survivors could heal in community.
- Provide all students with basic skills for responding to disclosures.
- Bring survivor support work into all aspects of prevention work.




Tips for Creating Your Own Survivor Support Network
